ARTICLE I
General Provisions

§ 360-1. Intent.

This chapter regulates the use of public and private sewers and drains and the discharge of waters and wastes into the public sewerage systems and prohibits discharge of septage into the public sewerage system within the Village of Endeavor. It provides for and explains the method used for levying and collecting wastewater treatment service charges, sets uniform requirements for discharges into the wastewater collection and treatment systems and enables the Village of Endeavor to comply with administrative provisions and other discharge criteria which are required or authorized by the State of Wisconsin or federal law. Its intent is to derive the maximum public benefit by regulating the characteristics of wastewater discharged into the Village of Endeavor sewerage system.

§ 360-2. Purpose; conflicts with other laws.

This chapter provides a means for determining wastewater volumes, constituents and characteristics, the setting of charges and fees, and the issuing of permits to certain users.

Revenues derived from the application of this chapter in conjunction with the current user charge system shall be used to defray the costs of operating and maintaining adequate wastewater collection and treatment systems and to provide sufficient funds for capital outlay, debt service costs and capital improvements. The charges and fees herein have been established pursuant to requirements of the Wisconsin Statutes. This chapter shall supersede any previous ordinance, rules or regulations and shall repeal all parts thereof that may be inconsistent with this chapter. If there is any conflict between this chapter and any applicable statute, the state statute shall be controlling.

ARTICLE II Definitions

§ 360-3. Definitions and word usage.

Unless the context specifically indicates otherwise, the meaning of terms used in this chapter shall be as follows. "May" is permissible; "shall" is mandatory.

AMMONIA NITROGEN (NH₃-N) — One of the oxidation states of nitrogen, in which nitrogen is combined with hydrogen in molecular form as NH₃ or in ionized form as NH₄. Quantitative determination of ammonia nitrogen shall be made in accordance with procedures set forth in Standard Methods or Ch. NR 149, Wis. Adm. Code.

APPROVING AUTHORITY — The Village of Endeavor or its duly authorized committee, agent, or representative.

BIOCHEMICAL OXYGEN DEMAND (BOD) — The quantity of oxygen utilized in the biochemical oxidation of organic matter in five days at 20° C., expressed as milligrams per liter. Quantitative determination of BOD shall be made in accordance with procedures set forth in the most recent edition of Standard Methods.

BUILDING DRAIN — That part of the lowest horizontal piping of a drainage system which receives the discharge from soil, waste, and other drainage pipes inside the wall of the building and conveys it to the building sewer.

BUILDING SEWER — The extension from the public sewer or other place of disposal beginning outside the inner face of the building wall.

COMMERCIAL USER — Any user whose premises is used primarily for the conduct of a profit-oriented enterprise in the fields of construction, wholesale or retail trade, finance, insurance, real estate or services and who discharges primarily normal domestic wastewater.

COMPATIBLE POLLUTANTS — Biochemical oxygen demand, suspended solids, phosphorus, ammonia, or pH, plus additional pollutants identified in the WPDES permit for the publicly owned treatment works receiving the pollutant if such works were designed to treat such additional pollutants to a substantial degree.

DOMESTIC WASTEWATER — Water-carried wastes normally discharging into the sanitary sewers from dwellings (including apartment houses and condominiums) and commercial establishments, free from stormwater and industrial waste. Domestic wastewater

shall have a strength of no more than 300 milligrams per liter BOD or 300 milligrams per liter suspended solids (as measured prior to the individual septic tanks).

EASEMENT — An acquired legal right for the specific use of property owned by another.

FLOATABLE OIL — Oil, fat, or grease in a physical state such that it will separate by gravity from wastewater by treatment in an approved pretreatment facility. A wastewater shall be considered free of floatable fat if it is properly pretreated and the wastewater does not interfere with the collection or treatment system.

GARBAGE — The residue from the preparation, cooking, and dispensing of food and from the handling, storage, and sale of food products and produce.

GROUND GARBAGE — The residue from the preparation, cooking, and dispensing of food that has been shredded to such degree that all particulates will be no greater than 1/2 inch in any dimension and will be carried freely in suspension under normal flow conditions in sewers.

INCOMPATIBLE POLLUTANTS OR WASTEWATER — Wastewater with pollutants or of such a strength that will adversely affect or disrupt the wastewater treatment processes or effluent quality or sludge quality if discharged to the sewerage system facility. Septage is considered an incompatible pollutant.

INDUSTRIAL WASTE or INDUSTRIAL WASTEWATER — The wastewater from industrial process, trade, or business, as distinct from sanitary sewage, including cooling water and the discharge from sewage pretreatment facilities.

LICENSED DISPOSER — A person or business holding a valid license to do septage servicing under Ch. NR 113, Wis. Adm. Code.

MUNICIPAL WASTEWATER — The wastewater of a community. From the standpoint of source, it may be a combination of the liquid and water-carried wastes from residences, commercial buildings, industrial plants and institutions together with any groundwater, surface water, and stormwater that may have entered inadvertently the sewerage system.

NATURAL OUTLET — Any outlet, including storm sewers, into a watercourse, pond, ditch, lake or other body of surface water or groundwater.

PARTS PER MILLION — A weight-to-weight ratio; the parts per million value multiplied by the factor 8.34 shall be equivalent to pounds per million gallons of water.

PERSON — Any and all persons, including any individual, firm, company, municipal or private corporation, association, society, institution, enterprise, governmental agency, or other entity.

pH — The logarithm of the reciprocal of hydrogen ion concentration. The concentration is the weight of hydrogen ions in grams per liter of solution. Neutral water, for example, has a pH value of seven and a hydrogen ion concentration of 10.

PHOSPHORUS — The total phosphorus in wastewater, which may be present in any of three principal forms: orthophosphates, polyphosphates, and organic phosphates. Quantitative

determination of total phosphorus shall be made in accordance with procedures set forth in Standard Methods.

POTW — Publicly owned treatment works.

PUBLIC SEWER — Any sewer provided by or subject to the jurisdiction of the Village of Endeavor. It shall also include sewers within or outside the corporate boundaries that serve one or more persons and ultimately discharge into the Village of Endeavor sanitary sewer system, even though those sewers may not have been constructed with Village funds.

RESIDENTIAL EQUIVALENT UNIT — The system whereby sewer user charges can be distributed amongst the different types of users on an equitable basis. The unit is use based and is established using a neutral parameter such as gallons of water used or volume of wastewater expected from a user.

RESIDENTIAL USER — Any user whose premises is used primarily as a domicile for one or more persons and discharges only domestic wastes, but not including dwellings classified as "commercial user."

SANITARY SEWAGE — A combination of liquid and water-carried wastes discharged from toilets and/or sanitary plumbing facilities together with such groundwater, surface water, and stormwater as may have inadvertently entered the sewerage system.

SANITARY SEWER — A sewer that carries liquid and water-carried wastes from residences, commercial buildings, industrial plants, and institutions, together with small quantities of groundwater, stormwater, and surface water that are not admitted intentionally.

SEPTAGE — The wastewater or contents of septic or holding tanks, dosing chambers, grease interceptors, seepage beds, seepage pits, seepage trenches, privies or portable rest rooms.

SEWAGE — The spent water of a community. The preferred term is "municipal wastewater."

SEWERAGE SYSTEM — All structures, conduits and pipes by which sewage is collected, treated, and disposed of, except plumbing inside and in connection with buildings served, and service pipes, from building to street main.

SEWER SERVICE AREAS — The areas presently served and anticipated to be served by a municipal wastewater collection system. Governed by state regulation (Ch. NR 121, Wis. Adm. Code).

SEWER SERVICE CHARGE — A service charge levied on users of the wastewater collection and treatment facilities for payment of use-related capital expenses as well as the operation and maintenance costs, including replacement of said facilities.

SEWER SYSTEM — The common sanitary sewers within a sewerage system which are primarily installed to receive wastewaters directly from facilities which convey wastewater from individual structures or from private property and which include service connection "Y" fittings designed for connection with those facilities. The facilities which convey wastewater from individual structures, from private property to the public sanitary sewer, or its equivalent, are specifically excluded from the definition of "sewerage collection system,"

except that pumping units and pressurized lines for individual structures or groups of structures may be included as part of a sewer system when such units are cost effective and are owned and maintained by the sewerage system owner. System lift stations or pumping stations are an integral part of the sewer system and are included in this definition of "sewer system."

SLUG LOAD — Any substance release at a discharge rate and/or concentration which causes interference to wastewater treatment processes or plugging or surcharging of the sewer system. Also referred to as "shock load."

STANDARD METHODS — The examination and analytical procedures set forth in the most recent edition of Standard Methods for the Examination of Water, Sewage, and Industrial Wastes, published jointly by the American Public Health Association, the American Water Works Association and the Water Environment Federation.

STORM DRAIN (sometimes termed "storm sewer") — Drain or sewer for conveying surface water, groundwater, subsurface water or unpolluted water from any source.

STORMWATER RUNOFF — That portion of the rainfall that is collected and drained into the storm sewers.

SUSPENDED SOLIDS — Solids that either float on the surface of or are in suspension in water, wastewater, septage, or other liquids and that are removable by laboratory filtering as prescribed in Standard Methods and are referred to as "nonfilterable residue."

TRUSTEES — The Board of Trustees of the Village of Endeavor.

UNPOLLUTED WATER — Water of quality equal or better than the effluent criteria in effect or water that would not cause violation of receiving water quality standards and would not be benefited by discharge to the sanitary sewers and wastewater treatment facilities provided.

USER — Any person who discharges or causes to be discharged domestic wastewater, industrial discharges or any other wastewater into the public sewer system.

WASTEWATER — The spent water of a community. From the standpoint of source, it may be a combination of the liquid and water-carried wastes from residential users, commercial users and industrial users, together with any groundwater, surface water, and stormwater that may be present but not intentionally admitted.

WASTEWATER FACILITIES — The structures, equipment, and processes required to collect, carry away, store, and treat domestic and industrial waste and dispose of the effluent and sludge.

WASTEWATER TREATMENT WORKS — An arrangement of devices and structures for treating wastewater, industrial waste, and sludge. Sometimes used synonymously with "waste treatment" or "wastewater treatment facilities" (WWTF) or "publicly owned treatment works" (POTW).

WATERCOURSE — A natural or artificial channel for the passage of water, either continuously or intermittently.

WISCONSIN POLLUTANT DISCHARGE ELIMINATION SYSTEM (WPDES) PERMIT — The document issued by the State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources which establishes effluent limitations and monitoring requirements for a municipal wastewater treatment facility.

ARTICLE III

Management, Operation and Control

§ 360-4. General authority.

The management, operation, and control of the sewer system and wastewater treatment facility for the Village of Endeavor are vested in the Village Board; all records, minutes and all written proceedings thereof and all financial records shall be kept by the Village Clerk-Treasurer.

§ 360-5. Construction of facilities and lines.

- A. The Sewer Utility of the Village of Endeavor, as directed by the Village Trustees, shall have the power to construct wastewater treatment facilities, transport facilities, and sewer lines for public use and shall have the power to lay sewer pipes in and through the alleys, streets, and public grounds of the Village of Endeavor and generally to do all such work as may be found necessary or convenient in the management of the sewer system and the wastewater treatment facility. The Village of Endeavor Board of Trustees shall have power by itself, its officers, agents and servants to enter upon any land for the purpose of making examination or to supervise in the performance of its duties under this chapter, without liability therefor, and the Board of Trustees of the Village of Endeavor shall have power to purchase and acquire for the Village of Endeavor all real and personal property which may be necessary for construction of the sewer system and treatment facilities or for any repair, remodeling, or additions thereto.
- B. Every user shall have a backflow preventor installed in the sewer lateral prior to the required septic tank. Every user shall have a septic tank installed between the building sewer lateral and the sanitary sewer system. Connections shall be made by permit only, using a licensed and certified contractor. The required permit is incorporated in this chapter, in Appendix B.¹ The individual property owner is responsible to have a backflow preventor, lateral, septic tank (with or without a pumping unit as required by the Village), and connection installed in accordance with the specifications and standard drawings incorporated in this chapter in Appendix A² and inspected by the designated Village approving authority. Upon completion of the system, inspection, and acceptance, the owner is required to turn over operation, maintenance, control and ownership of the septic tank and system connection from the inlet of the septic tank to the sewer main, along with the required easement, to the Village.

§ 360-6. Maintenance of services.

The individual property owner shall maintain sewer service from the house to the inlet of the septic tank, without expense to the Village of Endeavor. All sewer services must be maintained free of defective conditions by and at the expense of the owner or occupant of the property. When any sewer service is to be relaid and there are two or more buildings on such service, each building shall be disconnected from such service and a new sewer service shall be installed for each building in accordance with the standard drawings.

§ 360-7. Condemnation of real estate.

Whenever any real estate or any easement therein, or use thereof, shall, in the judgment of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Endeavor, be necessary to the sewer system or the wastewater treatment facilities, and whenever, for any cause, an agreement for the purchase thereof cannot be made with the owner thereof, the Village shall proceed with all necessary steps to take such real estate easement or use by condemnation in accordance with the Wisconsin Statutes and the Uniform Relocation and Real Property Acquisition Policy Act of 1970, if federal funds are used.

§ 360-8. Title to real estate and personal property.

All property, real, personal, and mixed, acquired for the construction of the sewer system, including the wastewater treatment facility, and all plans, specifications, diagrams, papers, books and records connected with said sewer system, and all buildings, machinery, and fixtures pertaining thereto, shall be the property of the Village of Endeavor.

ARTICLE IV**User Rules and Regulations****§ 360-9. General requirements.**

The rules, regulations, and sewer rates of the Village of Endeavor hereinafter set forth shall be considered a part of the contract with every person, company or corporation which is connected to or uses the Village of Endeavor sewer system or wastewater treatment facility, and every such person, company or corporation by connecting with the sewer system or wastewater treatment facility shall be considered as expressing its assent to be bound thereby. Whenever any of said rules and regulations, or such others as the Village of Endeavor may hereafter adopt, are violated, the use or service shall be shut off from the building or place of such violation (even though two or more parties are receiving service through the same connection) and shall not be reestablished except by order of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Endeavor and on payment of all arrears, the expenses and established charges of shutting off and putting on, and such other terms as the Village may determine and a satisfactory understanding with the party that no further cause for complaint shall arise. In case of such violation, the Village, furthermore, may declare any payment made for the service by the party or parties committing such violation to be forfeited, and the same shall thereupon be forfeited. The right is reserved to the Board of Trustees of the Village of Endeavor to change these said rules, regulations, and sewer rates from time to time as it may

deem advisable and to make special rates and contracts in all proper cases. The following rules and regulations for the government of licensed plumbers, sewer users and others are hereby adopted and established.

§ 360-10. Plumbers.

No plumber, pipe fitter, or other person will be permitted to do any plumbing or pipe fitting work in connection with the sewer system without first receiving a license from the State of Wisconsin and obtaining permission from the Village of Endeavor. All service connections to the sewer main shall comply with State Plumbing Code.

§ 360-11. Users.

- A. Mandatory hookup. The owner of each parcel of land adjacent to a sewer main on which there exists a building usable for human habitation or in a block through which such system is extended shall connect to such system within 365 days of notice in writing from the Village of Endeavor. The connection must be made using the required components, permitted, and inspected. Upon failure to connect or to use required components, the Village of Endeavor may cause such required connection to be made and bill the property owner for such costs. If such costs are not paid within 30 days, such notice shall be assessed as a special tax lien against the property; provided, however, that the owner may, within 30 days after the completion of the work, file a written option with the Village of Endeavor stating that he or she cannot pay such amount in one sum and asking that it be levied in not to exceed 10 equal installments, and the amount shall be so collected with interest at the rate of 10% per annum from the completion of the work, the unpaid balance being a special tax lien, all pursuant to § 66.0715, Wis. Stats.
- (1) In lieu of the above, the Village of Endeavor may, at its option, impose a penalty for the period that the violation continues, after 10 days' written notice to any owner failing to make a connection to the sewer system, of a forfeiture in the amount of \$150 per quarter for the period in which the failure to connect continues. Upon failure to make such payment said charge shall be assessed as a special tax lien against the property, all pursuant to § 66.0715, Wis. Stats.
 - (2) This chapter ordains that the failure to connect to the sewer system is contrary to the minimum health standards of the Village of Endeavor and fails to assure preservation of public health, comfort, and safety of the Village of Endeavor residents.
- B. Septic tank required. The use of septic tanks is required. Each sewer lateral shall connect to a septic tank, and each septic tank shall connect to the sanitary sewer system. The septic tank shall be installed at the owner's expense by an approved plumber using the standard drawings incorporated in this chapter as Appendix A.³ The owner shall obtain the required permit and shall have the installation inspected and certified using the

"Certification of Contractor" form located in Appendix B of this chapter.⁴ Only materials and equipment approved by the Village of Endeavor and in compliance with State of Wisconsin Administrative Code shall be used.

- C. Application for sewer service. Every person desiring to connect to the sewer system shall file an application in writing with the Village of Endeavor on such forms as are prescribed for that purpose. Such applications will be furnished at the office of the Clerk-Treasurer of the Village of Endeavor. The application must state fully and truthfully all the wastes which will be discharged. If the applicant is not the owner of the premises, the written consent of the owner must accompany the application. A copy of Form 1, "Village of Endeavor Application/Contract Sewer Connection," is located in Appendix B of this chapter.⁵ Persons connected to the sewer system of the Village of Endeavor are referred to herein as "users." If it appears that the service applied for will not provide adequate service for the contemplated use, the Village of Endeavor may reject the application. If the Village of Endeavor approves the application, it shall issue a permit for service as shown on the application.
- D. Septage disposal prohibited. Septage disposal to the collection system of the Village of Endeavor or the wastewater treatment facility is prohibited and is considered incompatible with the wastewater treatment system. Septage shall be removed from the septic tanks by a licensed hauler as contracted by the Village and shall be disposed of in compliance with all state and local codes. Septage pumping will take place in a three-year rotation. If pumping is needed before the rotation, the owner of the property is responsible for contacting a licensed hauler to set up the pumping and the owner is responsible for costs. If the problem is related to the line between the tank and lateral it is the responsibility of the Village.⁶
- E. Connection charge. Persons attaching to a sewer main shall have the lateral, septic tank, and pump(s) installed at their own expense from the sewer main to the building. Once the installation is inspected and certified using the prescribed form(s), the owner turns over possession, operation, maintenance and control of the portion of the connection from the inlet of the septic tank to the connection to the sewer to the Village, along with the required easement for that portion of the service.
- F. Tap permits. After sewer connections have been introduced into any building or upon any premises, no plumber shall make any alterations, extensions, or attachments, unless the party ordering such tapping or other work exhibits the proper permit for the same from the Village of Endeavor. No taps are permitted which would bypass the septic tank.
- G. User to keep in repair. All users shall keep their own service pipes in good repair and protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent any unnecessary overburdening of the sewer system.
- H. Backflow preventor. The sewer lateral shall also have a backflow preventor installed at the owner's expense.

- I. Basement drains, foundation drains, and roof drains are prohibited. No basement drains, foundation drains, sump pumps, roof drains, or catch basin drains are permitted. Stormwater and clear water sources must be excluded from the sanitary sewer system.
- J. User use only. No users shall allow other persons or other services to connect to the sewer system through their lateral.
- K. Vacating of premises and discontinuance of service. Whenever premises served by the system are to be vacated, or whenever any person desires to discontinue service from the system, the Village of Endeavor must be notified in writing. The owner of the premises shall be liable for any damages to the property of the system other than through the fault of the system or its employees, representatives, or agents.
- L. User to permit inspection. Every user shall permit the Village of Endeavor or its duly authorized agent, at all reasonable hours of the day, to enter its premises or building to examine the pipes and fixtures, and the manner in which the drains and sewer connections operate, and it must at all times, frankly and without concealment, answer all questions put to it relative to its use, all in accordance with this chapter and § 196.171, Wis. Stats.
- M. Utility responsibility. It is expressly stipulated that no claim shall be made against the Village of Endeavor or acting representative by reason of the breaking, clogging, stoppage, or freezing of any service pipes, nor from any damage arising from repairing mains, making connections or extensions or any other work that may be deemed necessary. The right is hereby reserved to cut off the service at any time for the purpose of repairs or any other necessary purpose, any permit granted or regulations to the contrary notwithstanding. Whenever it shall become necessary to shut off the sewer within any service area of the Village of Endeavor, the Village or the duly authorized agent shall, if practicable, give notice to each and every consumer within the affected area of the time when such service will be shut off.

§ 360-12. Excavations.

- A. In making excavations in streets or highways for laying service pipe or making repairs, the paving and the earth removed must be deposited in a manner that will result in the least inconvenience to the public.
- B. No person shall leave any such excavation made in any street or highway open at any time without barricades, and during the night warning lights must be maintained at such excavations.
- C. In refilling the opening, after the service pipes are laid, the earth must be laid in layers of not more than nine inches in depth and each layer thoroughly compacted to prevent settling. This work, together with the replacing of sidewalks, ballast and paving, must be done so as to make the street as good, at least, as before it was disturbed and satisfactory to the Village of Endeavor. No opening of the streets for tapping the pipes will be permitted when the ground is frozen.

§ 360-13. Tapping mains or collection pipes.

- A. No person, except those having special permission from the Village of Endeavor or persons in its service and approved by it, will be permitted under any circumstances to tap the mains or collection pipes. The kind and size of the connection with the pipe shall be that specified in the permits or order from the Village of Endeavor to ensure that new sewers and connections to the sewer system are properly designed and constructed.
- B. Pipes should always be tapped on top and not within six inches (15 centimeters) of the joint or within 24 inches (60 centimeters) of another lateral connection. All service connections to mains must comply with the State Plumbing Code. Lateral connections to existing sewers shall be made with saddles and by coring the existing sewer or by inserting (cutting in) a wye or tee into the existing sewer. The wye or tee shall be of the same pipe material as the existing sewer. The lateral/tee connection shall be made with approved adaptors or couplings.

§ 360-14. Installation of house laterals.

- A. All service pipes (laterals) on private property will be installed in accordance with State of Wisconsin Administrative Code Chapter Comm 82, Design, Construction, Installation, Supervision, and Inspections of Plumbing, especially § 82.30, Sanitary Drain Systems. There shall only be one building connected to a lateral unless waiver is obtained from the Village.
- B. As required by § Comm 82.34(5), Wis. Adm. Code, all laterals shall be inspected: "The building sewer and/or private interceptor gain sewer shall be inspected upon completion of placement of the pipe and before backfilling and tested before or after backfilling."

§ 360-15. Extensions.

The Village of Endeavor shall extend sewer mains to a new person(s) in accordance with the following charges and the following conditions:

- A. When an extension of a sewer main is required by the prospective user, said person shall make a written application to the Village of Endeavor. The Village or its authorized agent shall first determine the logical location of the next manhole or manholes. Next, the Village or its authorized agent shall determine the length and location of the extension, taking into consideration the prospective demands for service, the capacity of downstream facilities, and the orderly development of the particular area. No extension shall be made for a distance less than to the next manhole. All sewer extensions shall be constructed in compliance with local and state laws, ordinances, and regulations.
- B. The cost for the sewer extension may be paid by the person(s) requesting the extension under a developer's agreement or may be assessed to all benefiting parties at the Village's discretion.
- C. In addition to the charge made as above, each user shall pay the full cost of the lateral/septic tank/pumps (if pumps are required) and backflow preventor installation from the sewer main to the user's building.

§ 360-16. Private systems prohibited; existing drain fields. ⁷

The maintenance and use of private sewage disposal systems within the area of the Village are hereby declared to be a public nuisance and a health hazard. The use of any private sewage disposal system within the boundaries of the Village serviced by the sewerage system shall be prohibited. Private drain fields in existence upon approval of this chapter shall be exempt from this provision until such time as said drain fields fail. Upon failure, connection shall be made to the Village system by the property owner.

§ 360-17. Additional authority.

- A. The Village may at any time establish specific connection and lateral charges for any main not covered by other provisions in this chapter or when the Village has made an extension and the owner has failed to provide lateral or connection charges.
- B. It is further provided that the Village may amend or alter any connection or lateral charge after its establishment under the terms of this chapter or previous ordinance or resolutions.

§ 360-18. Standard drawings.

Figure 1 contains the plan and specification for a typical septic tank installation. Figure 2 contains the plan and specification for a typical septic/pump tank installation. The user is required to use one of these drawings as directed and permitted by the Village to install a new sewer service. If neither of the standard drawings is appropriate to the site, a variance must be requested by the owner and approved by the Village before proceeding. Figures 1 and 2 are included in Appendix A.⁸

§ 360-19. Forms required.

Form 1, Village of Endeavor Application/Contract Sewer Connection, and Form 2, Certification of Contractor, are included in Appendix B.⁹

ARTICLE V
Discharge Regulations

§ 360-20. General discharge prohibitions.

No discharger shall contribute or cause to be discharged directly or indirectly any of the following described substances into the wastewater disposal system or otherwise to the facilities of the Village of Endeavor:

- A. Any liquids, solids or gases which by reason of their nature or quantity are, or may be, sufficient either alone or by interaction to cause fire or explosion or be injurious in any other way to the operation of the Village of Endeavor sewer collection system or wastewater treatment facilities. This includes but is not limited to gasoline, naphtha, fuel oil, lubricating oil, and benzene.
- B. Solid or viscous substances which will or may cause obstruction to the flow in a sewer or other interference with the operation of the wastewater system. This includes but is not limited to ashes, cinders, sand, mud, straw, shavings, metal, glass, rags, feathers, tar, plastics, wood, paunch manure, etc.
- C. Any wastewater having a pH less than 5.5 or higher than 9.0 or having any other corrosive property capable of causing damage or hazard to structures, equipment, or personnel working with the collection system or wastewater treatment facility.
- D. Any wastewater containing toxic pollutants in sufficient quantity, either singly or by interaction, to injure or interfere with any wastewater treatment process, to constitute a hazard to humans or animals, or to exceed the limitation set forth in state or federal categorical pretreatment standards. A toxic pollutant shall include but not be limited to any pollutant identified in the toxic pollutant list set forth in Ch. NR 215, Wis. Adm. Code.
- E. Any noxious or malodorous liquids, gases, or solids which either singly or by interaction are capable of creating a public nuisance or hazard to life or are sufficient to prevent entry into the sewers for their maintenance and repair.
- F. Any substance which may cause the Village of Endeavor's effluent or treatment residues, sludges, or scums to be unsuitable for reclamation and reuse or to interfere with the reclamation process.
- G. Any substance which will cause the Village of Endeavor to violate its WPDES and/or other disposal system permits.
- H. Any substance with objectionable color not removed in the treatment process, such as, but not limited to, dye wastes and vegetable tanning solutions.
- I. Any wastewater or vapor having a temperature which will inhibit biological activity in the Village of Endeavor treatment works resulting in interference, but in no case wastewater with a temperature at the introduction into the publicly owned treatment works which exceeds 40° C. (104° F.).
- J. Any slug load, which shall mean any pollutant, including oxygen demanding pollutants (BOD, etc.), released in a single extraordinary discharge episode of such volume or strength as to cause interference to the publicly owned treatment works.
- K. Any unpolluted water, including but not limited to non-contact cooling water.
- L. Any wastewater containing any radioactive wastes or isotopes of such half life or concentration as exceed limits established by the Village in compliance with applicable state or federal regulations.

- M. Any wastewater which causes a hazard to human life or creates a public nuisance.
- N. Any stormwater, surface water, groundwater, roof runoff or surface drainage or any other connections from inflow sources to the sanitary sewer. Such waters may be discharged to a storm sewer or other waterway with permission of the Village of Endeavor.
- O. Any garbage that has not been properly shredded. Garbage grinders may be connected to sanitary sewers from homes, hotels, institutions, restaurants, or similar places where garbage originates from the preparation of food in kitchens for the purposes of consumption on the premises or when served by caterers.
- P. Any septage into a sewer manhole or any storage area located in the collection system which would cause the septage to be delivered to the wastewater treatment facility.
- Q. Any water or wastes which may contain more than 100 parts per million by weight of fat, oil, or grease.

§ 360-21. Limitations on wastewater strength.

- A. National categorical pretreatment standards. National categorical pretreatment standards as promulgated by the United States Environmental Protection Agency shall be met by all discharges of the regulated industrial categories.
- B. State requirements. State requirements and limitations on discharges to the publicly owned treatment works shall be met by all dischargers which are subject to such standards in any instance in which they are more stringent than federal requirements and limitations or those in this chapter or any other applicable ordinance.
- C. Right of revision. The Village reserves the right to amend this chapter to provide for more stringent limitations or requirements and discharges to the publicly owned treatment works where deemed necessary to comply with the objectives set forth in this chapter.
- D. Dilution. No discharger shall increase the use of potable or process water in any way or mix separate waste streams for the purpose of diluting a discharge as a partial or complete substitute for adequate treatment to achieve compliance with the standards set forth in this chapter.

§ 360-22. Supplementary limitations.

- A. No discharger shall discharge wastewater containing concentrations (and/or mass limitations) of the following enumerated materials, exceeding the following values: (No materials, concentrations or mass limitations are currently separately enumerated here. See information in other sections regarding domestic wastewater strength and prohibited discharges. The Village retains the right to modify or replace this section as it deems appropriate.)

- B. The Village may impose mass limitations on dischargers which are using dilution to meet the pretreatment standards or requirements of this chapter or in other cases where the imposition of mass limitations is deemed appropriate by the Village.

§ 360-23. Accidental discharges.

- A. Each discharger shall provide protection from accidental discharge of prohibited or regulated materials or substances established by this chapter. Where necessary, facilities to prevent accidental discharge of prohibited materials shall be provided and maintained at the discharger's cost and expense. Detailed plans showing facilities and operating procedures to provide this protection shall be submitted to the Village for review and shall be approved by the Village before construction of the facility. Review and approval of such plans and operating procedures by the Village shall not relieve the discharger from the responsibility to modify its facility as necessary to meet the requirements of this chapter.
- B. Dischargers shall notify the Village immediately upon the occurrence of a slug load or accidental discharge of substance prohibited by this chapter. The notification shall include location of discharge, date and time thereof, type of waste, concentration and volume, and corrective actions. Any discharger who discharges a slug load of prohibited materials shall be liable for any expense, loss or damage to the Village of Endeavor wastewater treatment facilities, in addition to the amount of any forfeitures imposed on the Village on account thereof under state or federal law.
- C. Signs shall be permanently posted in conspicuous places on discharger's premises advising employees whom to call in the event of a slug or accidental discharge. Employers shall instruct all employees who may cause or discover such a discharge with respect to emergency notification procedure.

§ 360-24. Damage recovery.

The Village of Endeavor shall have the right of recovery from all persons of any expense incurred by said authority as stated in § 360-53 of this chapter.

**ARTICLE VI
Sewer User Charge System**

§ 360-25. Definitions.

The following terms shall have the following meanings under this article:

DEBT SERVICE CHARGES — All costs associated with repayment of debts incurred for the construction and/or rehabilitation of the wastewater collection system and treatment facility.

NORMAL DOMESTIC STRENGTH WASTEWATER — Wastewater with concentrations of BOD₅ and suspended solid no greater than 300 milligrams per liter (mg/l).

NORMAL USER — A user whose contributions to the sewerage system consist only of normal domestic strength wastewater originating from a house, apartment, flat, or other living quarters occupied by a person or persons constituting a distinct household, business or commercial enterprise.

OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE COSTS — All costs associated with the operation and maintenance of the wastewater collection and treatment facilities. These costs, including costs associated with clear water flows, may be distributed in the same manner as operation and maintenance, by land area of users, or by number of hookups, and actual or estimated water usage shall be divided proportionately among the various sewer users.

REPLACEMENT COSTS — All costs necessary to accumulate the resources to replace equipment as required to maintain capacity and performance during the design life of the facility. A separate, segregated, distinct replacement fund shall be established and used for only replacement of equipment.

SEWER SERVICE CHARGE — A service charge levied on users of the sewerage system for payment of capital expenses as well as the operation and maintenance costs, including replacement of said facilities.

§ 360-26. Policy.

It shall be the policy of the Village to obtain sufficient revenues to pay the costs of the operation and maintenance of the sewerage facilities, including a replacement fund (i.e., a cash account to be used for future expenditures for obtaining or installing equipment, accessories or appurtenances which are necessary to maintain the capacity and performance of the sewerage system during the service life for which such facilities were designed and constructed), through a system of sewer service charges as defined in this article. The system shall assure that each user of the sewerage system pays its proportionate share of the cost of such facilities.

§ 360-27. Basis for service charge.

The fixed quarterly billing shall be sufficient to pay the debt service and reserve accounts. The unit price per volume shall be sufficient to pay the remaining annual cost of operation and maintenance, including any replacement fund, of the sewerage facilities. The method for determining the user charges is given in the user charge system, incorporated into this chapter as Appendix C.¹⁰ The Village of Endeavor has provided the initial estimates of number of users, costs, etc., to calculate the first year's user charges. Replacement costs are calculated using a twenty-year design life of the facility. The rates in this chapter shall be reviewed not less than biennially. Such review shall be performed by the Village or its authorized agents, and the rates shall be adjusted, as required, to reflect actual number and size of users and actual costs. Users will be notified annually of the portion of service charges attributable to operation and maintenance.

§ 360-28. Sewer service charges.

A sewer service charge is hereby imposed upon each lot, parcel of land, building, or premises served by the public sewer and wastewater facilities or otherwise discharging sewage, including industrial wastes, into the public sewerage system. Such sewer service charge shall be payable as hereinafter provided and in amount determinable as follows:

A. Fixed quarterly user charge. The annual debt service and reserve account payments are distributed to all users on an equal basis. To determine the appropriate fixed quarterly user charge for each user class, residential equivalent units (REUs) are used. Therefore, the fixed quarterly charges for each customer will vary but will be equal on an REU basis. The fixed quarterly user charge per REU is determined as follows:

- (1) Annual fixed cost = debt service payment plus reserve account payment.
- (2) Fixed quarterly charge = annual fixed cost divided by four.
- (3) Fixed quarterly charge per REU = fixed quarterly charge/REUs.

B. Variable quarterly charge. Annual variable cost is determined similarly to the fixed cost. It is also a flat rate applied using REUs to make the system equitable. The variable quarterly charge is determined as follows:

- (1) Annual variable cost = annual operation and maintenance cost plus annual equipment replacement.
- (2) Quarterly variable cost = annual variable cost divided by four.
- (3) Variable quarterly use charge per REU = quarterly variable cost/REUs.

C. Sewer user charge. The quarterly sewer user charge for any individual user equals the fixed quarterly user charge times the assigned REU value plus the variable quarterly charge times the assigned REU value.

§ 360-29. Reassignment of sewer users.

The Village will reassign sewer users into appropriate sewer service user classes if wastewater sampling programs and other related information indicate a change of categories is necessary.

§ 360-30. User charge rates.

User charge rates shall be set forth by Appendix C, as may be revised from time to time, attached hereto and made a part hereof.¹¹

ARTICLE VII

Control of Industrial and Septage Wastes**§ 360-31. Industrial discharges.**

If any waters, wastes or septage discharged, or proposed to be discharged, to the public sewerage system contains substances or possesses the characteristics enumerated in Article V and which, in the judgment of the Village of Endeavor, may be detrimental to the sewerage system, the Village may:

- A. Reject the wastes.
- B. Require pretreatment to an acceptable condition for discharge to the sewerage system.
- C. Require a control over the quantities and rates of discharge.
- D. Require payment to cover the added cost of handling and treating the waste not covered by existing taxes or sewer charges under the provisions of Article VI.

§ 360-32. Control manholes.

- A. Each person discharging industrial wastes into a public sewer shall construct and maintain one or more control manholes or access points to facilitate observation, measurement, and sampling of his waste, including domestic sewage.
- B. Control manholes or access facilities shall be located and built in a manner acceptable to the Village. If measuring devices are to be permanently installed, they shall be of a type acceptable to the Village.
- C. Control manholes, access facilities, and related equipment shall be installed by the person discharging the industrial waste, at his expense, and shall be maintained by the person discharging the waste so as to be in safe condition, accessible, and in proper operating condition at all times. Plans for installation of the control manholes or access facilities and related equipment shall be approved by the prior to the beginning of construction.

§ 360-33. Measurement of flow.

The measurement used for computing the sewer service and the cost recovery charges for nonseptage disposal shall be based upon REU equivalent for the type of user. If the user wishes to show actual water use, the Village may, at its discretion, allow the water consumption of the entity to be monitored and the REU value recalculated.

§ 360-34. Provision for deductions.

In the event that a person discharging industrial waste into the public sewers produces evidence satisfactory to the Village that more than 10% of the total annual volume of water used for all purposes does not reach the public sewer, then the determination of the water consumption to be used in computing the REU equivalents of the waste volume discharged into the public sewer may be made a matter of agreement between the Village and the industrial waste discharger.

§ 360-35. Metering of waste.

Devices for measuring the volume of waste discharged may be required by the Village if this volume cannot otherwise be determined from other records. Metering devices for determining the volume of water shall be installed, owned, and maintained by the person discharging the wastewater. Following approval and installation, such meters may not be removed without the consent of the Village.

§ 360-36. Waste sampling.

- A. Industrial wastes and septage discharged into the public sewers shall be subject to periodic inspection and a determination of character and concentration of said waste at least quarterly. The determinations shall be required by the Village.
- B. Samples shall be collected in such a manner as to be representative of the composition of the wastes. The sampling may be accomplished either manually or by the use of mechanical equipment acceptable to the Village. A minimum of at least quarterly sampling shall be necessary to determine sewer service charges.
- C. Testing facilities shall be the responsibility of the person discharging the waste or septage and shall be subject to the approval of the Village or its duly authorized representatives at all times. Every care shall be exercised in the collection of samples to ensure their preservation in a state comparable to that at the time the sample was taken.

§ 360-37. Pretreatment.

When required, in the opinion of the Village, to modify or eliminate wastes that are harmful to the structures, processes, or operation of the sewerage system, the discharger shall provide at its expense such preliminary treatment or processing facilities as may be required to render this waste acceptable for admission to the public sewers.

§ 360-38. Grease, oil and sand interceptors.

- A. Grease, oil and sand interceptors shall be provided by the industrial discharger and shall be located as to be readily and easily accessible for cleaning and inspection. In the maintaining of these interceptors, the discharger shall be responsible for the proper removal and disposal by appropriate means of the captured material and shall maintain records of the dates and means of disposal which are subject to review by the Village. Any removal and hauling of the collected materials not performed by the discharger's personnel must be performed by currently licensed disposal firms.
- B. Depending on the type of industry, monthly monitoring may be required. No industry should be monitored less than quarterly. Monitoring must be done so the industry will be properly billed for sewer use charges.

§ 360-39. Measurements, tests and analyses.

- A. All measurements, tests, and analyses of the characteristics of water and waste to which reference is made in this chapter shall be determined in accordance with the latest edition of Standard Methods for the Examination of Water and Wastewater, published by the American Public Health Association, and Guidelines Establishing Test Procedures for Analysis of Pollutants (1978, 40 CFR 136). Sampling methods, locations, times, durations, and frequencies are to be determined on an individual basis subject to approval by the Village.
- B. Determination of the character and concentration of the industrial wastes shall be made by the person discharging them or his agent, as designated and required by the Village. The Village may also make its own analyses of the wastes and these determinations shall be used as a basis for charges. If the person discharging the waste contests the determination, he may elect to have an independent laboratory determine the character and concentration of the waste. Said independent laboratory shall be certified under Ch. NR 149, Wis. Adm. Code, and be acceptable to both the Village and the person discharging the waste. All costs incurred by the independent laboratory in making the determination shall be assumed by the discharger.

§ 360-40. Submission of information.

Plans, specifications, and any other pertinent information relating to proposed flow equalization, pretreatment, or processing facilities shall be submitted for review of the Village prior to the start of their construction if the effluent from such facilities is to be discharged into the public sewers.

§ 360-41. Submission of basic data.

- A. Within three months after passage of this chapter, each person who discharges industrial wastes to a public sewer shall prepare and file with the Village a report that shall include pertinent data relating to the quantity and characteristics of the waste discharged to the sewerage system.

- B. Similarly, each person desiring to make a new connection to a public sewer for the purpose of discharging industrial wastes shall prepare and file with the Village a report that shall include actual or predicted data relating to the quantity and characteristics of the waste to be discharged.

§ 360-42. Extension of time.

When it can be demonstrated that circumstances exist which would create an unreasonable burden on the person proposing to discharge a waste to comply with the time schedule imposed herein, a request for extension of the time may be presented for consideration to the Village.

ARTICLE VIII
Payment of Charges

§ 360-43. Payment and penalty.

The sewerage service charge shall be assessed quarterly and shall be payable to the Village not later than 30 days after the end of each period. A penalty of 1.0% per month shall be added to all bills not paid by five days after the date fixed for final payment.

§ 360-44. Lien on property.

All sewage charges shall be a lien upon the property serviced pursuant to § 66.0809(3), Wis. Stats., and shall be collected in the manner therein provided.

§ 360-45. Disposition of revenue.

The amounts received from the collection of charges authorized by this chapter shall be credited to a sanitary sewerage account which shall show all receipts and expenditures of the sewerage system. Charges collected for replacement expenses shall be credited to a segregated, nonlapsing replacement account. These funds are to be used exclusively for replacement. When appropriated by the Village, the credits to the sanitary sewerage account shall be available for the payment of the requirements for operation, maintenance, repairs, and depreciation of the sewerage system consistent with § NR 162.08, Wis. Adm. Code. Any surplus outside the requirements of § NR 162.08 in said account shall be available for the payment of principal and interest of bonds issued and outstanding, or which may be issued, to provide funds for said sewerage system, or part thereof, and all or a part of the expenses for additions and improvements and other necessary disbursements or indebtedness, and the Village may resolve to pledge each surplus or any part thereof for any such purpose. All present outstanding sewer system general obligation bonds, including the refunding bonds, shall be paid from this fund as to both principal and interest.

§ 360-46. Additional charges.

Additional charges shall be imposed upon each lot, parcel of land, building, or premises served by public sewer and wastewater facilities located outside the boundaries of the Village to equalize local capital costs. Such additional charges shall result in a minimum charge for each user according to the schedule for debt repayment from utility revenues. Such additional charges shall be added to the sewer bill for each billing period.

§ 360-47. Excess revenues.

Excess revenues collected from a user class will be applied to operation and maintenance costs attributable to that class for the next year.

ARTICLE IX**Audit****§ 360-48. Annual audit.**

The Village shall have conducted an independent annual audit, the purpose of which shall be to maintain the proportionality between users and user classes of the user charge system and to ensure that adequate revenues are available relative to increasing operation, maintenance and replacement costs and debt retirement. The findings and recommendations of this audit shall be made available for public inspection in accordance with the governing statute.

ARTICLE X**Enforcement****§ 360-49. Damaging or tampering with facilities.**

No unauthorized person shall maliciously, willfully, or negligently break, damage, destroy, uncover, deface, or tamper with any structure, appurtenance, or equipment which is a part of the sewage system or wastewater treatment facility. Any person violating this provision shall be subject to immediate arrest under charge of disorderly conduct.

§ 360-50. Written notice of violation.

- A. Any person connected to the sewerage system found to be violating a provision of this chapter shall be served by the Village with a written notice stating the nature of the violation and providing a reasonable time for the satisfactory correction thereof. The offender shall, within the period of time stated in such notice, permanently cease all violations.
- B. Any licensed disposer discharging to the sewerage system which is in violation of the provisions of this chapter may have its license and/or contract to service the septic tanks immediately revoked. This revocation shall be done in writing and state the reasons for revoking the septage service approval.

§ 360-51. Continuing violations.

Any person, partnership, or corporation, or any officer, agent, or employee thereof, who shall continue any violation beyond the aforesaid notice time limit provided shall, upon conviction thereof, forfeit not less than \$25 nor more than \$500 per day together with the costs of prosecution. Each day in which any violation is continued beyond the aforesaid notice time limit shall be deemed a separate offense.

§ 360-52. Liability to Village for losses.

Any person violating any provision of this chapter shall become liable to the Village for any expense, loss, or damage occasioned by reason of such violation which the Village may suffer as a result thereof.

§ 360-53. Damage recovery.

The Village of Endeavor shall have the right of recovery from all persons of any expense incurred by said authority for the repair or replacement of any sewer pipe, collection system unit, or treatment unit damaged in any manner by any person by the performance of any work under that person's control, by introduction of prohibited waste into the collection system or treatment facility, or by any negligent act.

§ 360-54. Violations and penalties.

Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this chapter or rules or regulations of the Village or who shall connect a service pipe or discharge without first having obtained a permit therefor or who shall violate any provisions of the Wisconsin Statutes, Wisconsin Administrative Code, or any other materials which are incorporated by reference shall, upon conviction thereof, forfeit not less than \$25 nor more than \$500 for each violation, and the costs of prosecution. This, however, shall not bar the Village from enforcing the connection duties set out in § 360-11A for mandatory hookup.

§ 360-55. Appeals.

Any user affected by any decision, action, or determination, including cease and desist orders, made by the interpreting or implementing provisions of this chapter may file with the Village a written request for reconsideration within 10 days of the date of such decision, action, or determination, setting forth in detail the facts supporting the user's request for reconsideration. The Village, upon receiving the request for reconsideration, shall publish the request in the Village's official newspaper. The Village shall render a decision on the request for reconsideration to the user in writing within 15 days of receipt of the request.

§ 360-56. Additional sewer pumping.¹²

12. Editor's Note: Added at time of adoption of Code (see Ch. 1, General Provisions, Art. II).

Sewer pumping takes place on a set three-year rotation which is recorded at the Village office. If pumping is required before the rotation the property owner is responsible for contacting an agency to do the pumping and for all costs incurred.

§ 360-57. Amendments.

The Village of Endeavor, through its duly qualified governing body, may amend this chapter in part or in whole whenever it may deem necessary.
